Why Now and Why Schar:

Physical and digital flows that the global economy depends on — energy, trade, data — are concentrated in and through maritime chokepoints that are now demonstrably weaponizable, and the U.S. capacity to guarantee them is being questioned.

If existing infrastructure (seabed cables, Hormuz, the terrestrial grid) is vulnerable and constrained, space-based economic, energy, and data solutions are a strategic hedge. Along with the future of nuclear and geothermal power, space represents the next horizon of national security, energy resilience, and economic statecraft.

Schar School is marking our **10th Anniversary** under the banner of "Building on a Decade of Impact." We are honoring the faculty, students, partners, and leaders who have driven transformative research while accelerating our mission for the decade ahead. A core pillar of the Schar School's vision for the next ten years is tackling evolving global vulnerabilities through specialized centers such as the Center for Security Policy Studies (CSPS) and the Center for Energy Science and Policy (CESP).

1. The Converging Inflection Point

The 8th Annual Mason Energy Forum convenes at a pivotal strategic juncture for George Mason University and Northern Virginia. In 2026, three institutional milestones intersect: the 10th anniversary of the Schar School of Policy and Government, the opening of the Fuse at Mason Square innovation hub (housing the Institute for Digital Innovation), and the maturation of GMU's applied research assets—including the NuScale Energy Exploration (E2) Center simulator and the George Mason University Space Innovation Center (GMUSIC). Together, these platforms address a crucial challenge: as AI energy consumption strains regional power grids, global conflict threatens maritime supply networks where resilient energy and data infrastructure originate. How will these domains be governed as space becomes a feature?

2. Symposium Panel Focus

- **Panels 1 and 2: Maritime Chokepoints, Global Supply Chains and Peace and Security:** These panels examine the underlying dynamics that bring energy security and national security together. They explore disruptions in energy supply chains and trends in naval and commercial shipping, and consider the status of international law, naval readiness, and different strategies in distinct energy-producing regions of the world.
- **Panel 3: Space as the New Energy Resource Infrastructure.** With the ongoing boom of the Low Earth Orbit (LEO) economy, industry experts discuss how space infrastructure and technologies are enabling new energy resources. These capabilities include orbital and lunar data centers and advancing nuclear energy capabilities to power lunar bases and commercialization of deep space exploration. The panel will also discuss if expansion of space-based energy infrastructure demands new regulatory and international law framework.
- **Panel 4: SMR and Geothermal Enclaves for Data Center Development and Grid Security:** Northern Virginia's energy demand is driven by explosive AI data center growth. Space-based and terrestrial options abound to meet this demand. Panel 4 explores behind-the-meter generation, Small Modular Reactor (SMR) enclaves, geothermal microgrids, and the challenging economic question of how hyperscalers will deploy next-generation power solutions, as well as the challenges these new solutions (including space-based solutions) pose for grid security.

3. Sponsoring Centers

Center for Security Policy Studies (CSPS)

CSPS trains students to lead crisis simulations, policy conferences, and workshops. The center advances the study and practice of strategic thinking on international security problems by convening an annual symposium for practitioners and scholars, conducting simulations with experts from both the military and civilian communities, and publishing monographs on security challenges. The scope of security studies continues to expand beyond the familiar terrain of great power rivalries and changing dynamics in international politics. In the 21st century, states grapple with ever-changing challenges from porous borders, uneven access to natural resources, and emerging technologies that are difficult to manage.

Center for Energy Science and Policy (CESP)

CESP is a joint initiative of the [Schar School of Policy and Government](#), the [College of Science](#), and the [School of Business](#). It is a multidisciplinary, vibrant, energy science and policy hub at George Mason University. The Center focuses on developing innovative, integrative applied science and policy solutions for the energy security, sustainability, and resilience challenges of Virginia and beyond. This external reach is reflected in the MOU it has developed with the Bundeswehr University in Munich, Germany. The Center's research and analysis emphasize in-depth qualitative studies, as well as statistical and economic analyses. In addition to energy research, the Center offers innovative educational opportunities through interactive workshops with practitioners, policymakers, and academics on key issues related to energy security, sustainability, and resilience.
